<u>WINTER MEETING</u> - The winter meeting of the Historical Society will be held on January 19, 1977, at Taylor Park Recreation Center at 8 pm. Mr. Joseph De Caro, photo-journalist, magazine writer, and lecturer, will present a slide-lecture program on New Jersey's participation in the Revolutionary War, with a special section devoted to the Battle of Springfield. There will also be committee progress reports by several members of the Society.

<u>DID YOU KNOW</u> that Millburn Township was formed on March 20, 1857, from part of Springfield Township? On that date Union County was carved out of the southern portion of Essex County. The boundary established almost coincided with that of the Elizabeth Township and Borough of the eighteenth century.

Since incorporation, there have been seven changes in the boundaries of Millburn. In 1863, a large section on the east was ceded to South Orange Township. This ceded area is a sizeable portion of present day Maplewood Township, formed in 1922. In 1891, the acreage south of Springfield Avenue between the east and west branches of the Rahway River was returned to Springfield Township. Most other changes have been minor adjustments along Millburn Avenue and Morris Turnpike. Millburn acquired a 1,575 foot strip, 20 to 23 feet wide, along the south side of Millburn Avenue from King's market to the south side of Morris Turnpike for road widening purposes. This includes a portion of Sak's front lawn. To allow cohesive development of the Rippling Brook area adjacent to White Oak Ridge Road, an exchange of land was made with Livingston in 1965. Our straight border with that town thus became a zig-zag.

Detailed references and information for inquisitive researchers are on hand.

TOWNSHIP DAY - The Society is asking the Township Committee for a proclamation designating March 20 "Millburn Township Day." It is hoped that it will become a day on which a variety of Township events, celebrating our legal--if not our actual historical--beginnings, will be held.

BALLANTINE HOUSE TOUR - A guided tour of the recently restored Ballantine House, adjacent to the Newark Museum, has been arranged for the Society. This fine example of late Victorian architecture was built by the president of the properous brewery in 1883. The Museum has recreated the home's grandeur with some original furnishings, luxurious tapestries, and a large table set with period china and silver.
