ESKERVILLE, KAME PLACE, OR SHORT HILLS - In Vol. I, No. 1, the Thistle explained how Millburn got its name. Now, the eskers and kames...esker, from the Old Irish, means a long narrow ridge of coarse gravel, deposited by a stream flowing in an ice-walled valley or tunnel in a decaying glacial ice sheet. A kame, Scottish from Middle English, refers to a small conical hill of sand and gravel deposited during the melting of glacial ice. The Indians, unburdened by geological cant, simply called this area "Little Hills," and early settlers translated that to "the
