WALKING TOUR - Save Sunday afternoon, October 19, for the Society's fifth annual architectural walking tour. Architectural historian Sandy Brown will again be our tour guide as we amble through the area of town featured in the Society's new booklet on Short Hills Park. What more pleasant way is there to learn about the significant older homes in our neighborhoods? Details of time and meeting place for the walking tour will be forthcoming in The Item.

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GARDEN SLIDES - The Society has recently received a set of slides which show early views of private gardens in the Township. A gift of the Short Hills Garden Club, the slides were compiled by landscape architect, Mrs. John Poinier, who is a member of the Club, and they are accompanied by her descriptive outline. The Society is happy to accept this valuable addition to its archives and plans to make the slides available for showing in the community.

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CRIME AND PUNISHMENT - While reviewing some of the Society's oral history tapes, Jenks Schacter came across this story of a difficult

"When we first moved here," said the raconteur, "there was a woman who lived in our area whose husband was an important employee of the telephone company and he had been sent to Europe. This was during the first World War. Perhaps due to the strain of worry about her husband - or whatever the woman had difficulties with the neighbors and became known as a common scold. A case against her was brought to court and she was convicted as a common scold. The old penalty for this misdemeanor was the ducking stool and it was still a law on the the N.J. books. But then her husband returned from Europe and he induced the neighbors to relent. so the conviction was overturned. I believe that after that the law was removed from the books and we no longer have a ducking stool penalty in N.J."

That's good news for the sharp-tongued among us! Whether it be a remnant of colonial justice, a rumor of scandal or a reminder of halcyon days, oral histories taken from the town's old timers are filled with interesting information about people and places in the Millburn-Short Hills of the past.

NEW PUBLICATION - "Sticks, Shingles and Stones," a 40 page booklet about Stewart Hartshorn's Short Hills, is scheduled for release by the Society on Saturday, September 20.

The booklet explores the history and architecture of the earliest section of Short Hills which Stewart Hartshorn began to develop in 1878. It opens with a piece written by Van Reintjes on Stewart Hartshorn and his dream of an "ideal community." Celeste Penney is the author of an essay which places the beginnings of Short Hills in historical context and offers glimpses of life in Hartshorn's village in the late 1880's and early 1890's.

The largest part of the booklet is devoted to the architecture of Short Hills Park. It is written by Barbara Cole Smith and illustrated with photographs by Robert Reichert. Each major architectural style represented in the Short Hills of Hartshorn's day is described in text and captions and its derivation from earlier British and American architectural styles explained.

Ann Klemme was editor in chief of the publication. Others contributing to the effort were Joan Mebane, Owen Lampe, Steven Bauer and Sandy Brown. Layout is by Benway, Maxwell and Smith, publishers, in Chatham.

EXHIBITION - Historical Society members, residents of the homes in the Short Hills Park Historic District and volunteers who helped with the Architectural and Historical Survey of Millburn Township will attend a preview and exhibition to celebrate the publication of "Sticks, Shingles and Stones," the second in a series of booklets being issued by the Society. The event will take place on Friday evening, September 19 at Petan Art Gallery, 545 Millburn Avenue from 7:30 to 9:30.

The exhibition will feature enlarged photographs by New York photographer Robert Reichert of about 45 Short Hills houses. Retained by the Society to do the architectural photography for the booklet, Reichert served an internship at the International Center for Photography in New York which later held a one man show of his suburban landscapes. One of his photos was chosen by the Light Gallery as their contribution to the Channel 13 art auction.

Also on view will be three line drawings executed by Steven Bauer for the booklet. Mr. Bauer, graphic artist and architectural historian, is associated with David Gibson, the Society's consultant for the Survey. The artists will be present at the exhibit and arrangements may be made for the purchase of any of the works.

Following Friday night's preview, the exhibition will be open to the public beginning on Saturday, September 20.
