ANNUAL MEETING Sunday, May 23, 1982 - 3:00 p.m. Christ Church Parish Hall

The Millburn-Short Hills Historical Society will hold its annual meeting this year at Christ Church in recognition of the 100th anniversary of the founding of this Short Hills landmark. A two-part program will begin with a historical slide show developed for the Church centennial by Society Trustee Owen Lampe. The slides chronicle the changes in the building since its construction in the 1880's.

Following Mr. Lampe's presentation, Warren Hansen will speak on the history of the harpsichord and demonstrate the attributes of the instrument by playing a selection of French harpsichord music of the 17th and 18th century. Mr. Hansen knows the harpsichord "inside and out" as he has built one for himself. For this concert, however, he will play a double keyboard harpsichord built by William Hyman.

<u>PORTRAIT GIFT TO SOCIETY</u> - Saverio Gallitelli, a long-time resident of Millburn, has presented the Millburn-Short Hills Historical Society with a portrait of his former employer, the late Edward S. Pettigrew. Mr. Gallitelli chose the Society as the recipient of the portrait because he knew of our interest in preserving the (continued) PORTRAIT GIFT (continued)

Township's past.

Mr. Pettigrew was a prominent businessman whose Hillside Avenue home was widely known for its landscaping. He was largely responsible for the fine plantings in Taylor Park, and local institutions which benefited from his philanthropic gifts included the Board of Education, Neighborhood Association, the Rotary Club, St. Stephen's Church and Cemetery, and Christ Church.

Mr. Gallitelli presented the portrait to the Society with the expectation that it be made available for display in this community and others as a means of honoring Mr. Pettigrew and his good works. The portrait, a 35" x 37" oil painting by Carlton Glidden, is currently on loan to the Millburn Public Library.

The Society Board wishes to express its appreciation to Mr. Gallitelli for this significant gift. Thanks are due also to Richard Chapman for appraising the portrait.

125 YEARS OLD - On March 20, 1857 by an act of the 81st Legislature of the State of New Jersey, a new township, Millburn, was created from a portion of Springfield Township.

According to Township Historian, Marian K. Meisner, author of Millburn 1857-1957 which was published for the Millburn centennial, a duly elected Township Committee agreed to accept funds totalling \$668.78, debts of \$74.59 and the care of 11 paupers. In April 1858 the Committee resolved to raise \$1000: \$2 for the education of each "public school scholar", \$600 for roads, and \$75 for miscellaneous expenses. A modest start for the municipality in which we now live! The Township budget for 1982-83 totals more than 37 million dollars and includes about \$4000 for each "public school scholar."

1857 was also the year when James Buchanan was inaugurated as our 15th president, William Howard Taft was born, Tom Brown's Schooldays was published, Tsar Alexander II began emancipating the Russian serfs, E.G. Otis installed the first "safety" elevator, and the trans-Atlantic cable was begun. O glorious age!

VOLUNTEERS PRESERVE THE PAST - A group of Society volunteers led by Bernadette Wagner has begun the work of indexing back issues of The Item for the Millburn Public Library. The Library's collection of newspapers on tape begins with the 1930 issues of The Item. That is the year the paper reported the installation of the first phone at the Millburn Post Office (#123), a second annual horse show at the corner of Millburn Avenue and Lackawanna Place, and a \$90,000 fund raising campaign to build a new Wyoming Church. Volunteers are needed for this project during the summer months. Sign up and find out what Millburn was like before World War II.

Another group of members has been working on the Society's archives which consist of books, pamphlets, oral history tapes, newspaper and magazine clippings, maps, letters, photographs and even some complicated genealogical charts.
