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Brief History of Millburn's White Oak Ridge

The township of Millburn was started when settlers - who were attracted by the fertile soil, the natural beauty of the land, and an abundance of clear, purified water - moved out from nearby Elizabethtown and Newark. They built their homes here and eventually also grist mills, forges, inns and other buildings to form a little addition to the town of Springfield.

Two of the earliest Millburn settlers were brothers Thomas and Nicholas Parcel. They were granted land from Queen Anne. Thomas Parcel built his house, later called the Parcel (Parsil) House, on a nameless clearing in the forest. The road would later be called Feather Bed Lane and then White Oak Ridge Road. Thomas' house stills stands across the street from the present Parsil Family Cemerty at White Oak Ridge Road. The house, now at 365 White Oak Ridge Rd., has the date 1709 carved in the chimney stone and it is believed to be one of the first built in the area. Nicholas' home was nearby. Thomas and Nicholas Parcel were two of the largest landowners in that part of the country, owning an estimated 2,500 acres, comprising a large part of what is now the East Orange watershed. The two also allegedly built an inn, called the Parcel (Parsil) Inn, as a stop for weary travelers on their way to Elizabethtown and Perth Amboy. Other known pioneers' names were Ross, Parkhurst, Morehouse, Dean, Meeker, Brant, Thomas, Nichols, Drew and Denman.

The family name was sometimes spelled Parsil, Parcell, Parsel, Parcil, Parcel and Parsell. Parsil is the modern spelling preferred by present family members.

When the Revolutionary War started, both Thomas and Nicholas Parcel enlisted. They joined a militia that comprised about 1,000 men from Springfield (and Millburn), Union, Chatham and Elizabeth.

Thomas Parcel was wounded and ended up dying at his house on July 4, 1778. At his death, the Parsil cemetery was created. The cemetery had a stone wall surrounding it, but it is mostly gone now. The cemetery includes 24 to 28 extended family members of Thomas and Nicholas Parcel. Sarah Parsil was the last person interred into the cemetery in 1933. Thomas and Nicholas Parcel were Revolutionary War soldiers and William H. Sprigg and Samuel Parsil were Civil War soldiers.



The first permanent church in the community was organized in October 1831 by William Parsil, when he called together his neighbors on White Oak Ridge and talked to them of the need to establish their own meeting place for a Sunday school and other Sabbath observances. Many from the Ridge community had been attending services in other communities, including the Chatham Village Presbyterian Church. From that meeting grew the Oak Ridge Sunday School Association. The group met in the one-room public school house which served the children of that section for many years. The association did not have an ordained minister at first; William was in charge of the church, managed the school and led the singing. Jacob Morehouse, John Denman, Aaron Ross, and his wife, Hetty Parsil, assisted William in the bible and catechism classes. After William Parsil's death in 1850, the Sunday school struggled and was temporarily disbanded due to the loss of his strong guiding hand and also the loss of many old parishioners who moved or died. In 1857, A. M. French reorganized the Sunday school. Teachers were appointed and William Parsil's nephew William H. Parsil, was made secretary and librarian of the reorganized school. The one-room school

house soon became inadequate for the number of members. In 1871, William H. Parsil gave land to the association for the erection of a church, which was named the White Oak Ridge Chapel. The Oak Ridge Union Sunday School Association was formed in the same year with a board of trustees created to handle its affairs. In 1986, the church closed its doors and the building was given to the Covenant Presbyterian Church. The church is just around the corner from the Parsil House, at 291 Parsonage Hill Rd.

The cemetery land was deeded to the Essex County Board of Chosen Freeholders upon Samuel B. Parsil's death in 1919, according to research by Millburn-Short Hills Historical Society member Jennifer Nichols in 2001. In 1957, the cemetery deed was handed over to the Daughters of the American Revolution. That same year, a restoration of the cemetery took place thanks to the efforts of the DAR, the Passaic Valley Chapter of the Sons of the American Revolution and the Millburn Shade Tree Commission. The stone wall was replaced by an iron railing and a new gate. The plaque on the gate was donated by the Wheaton family of Short Hills.

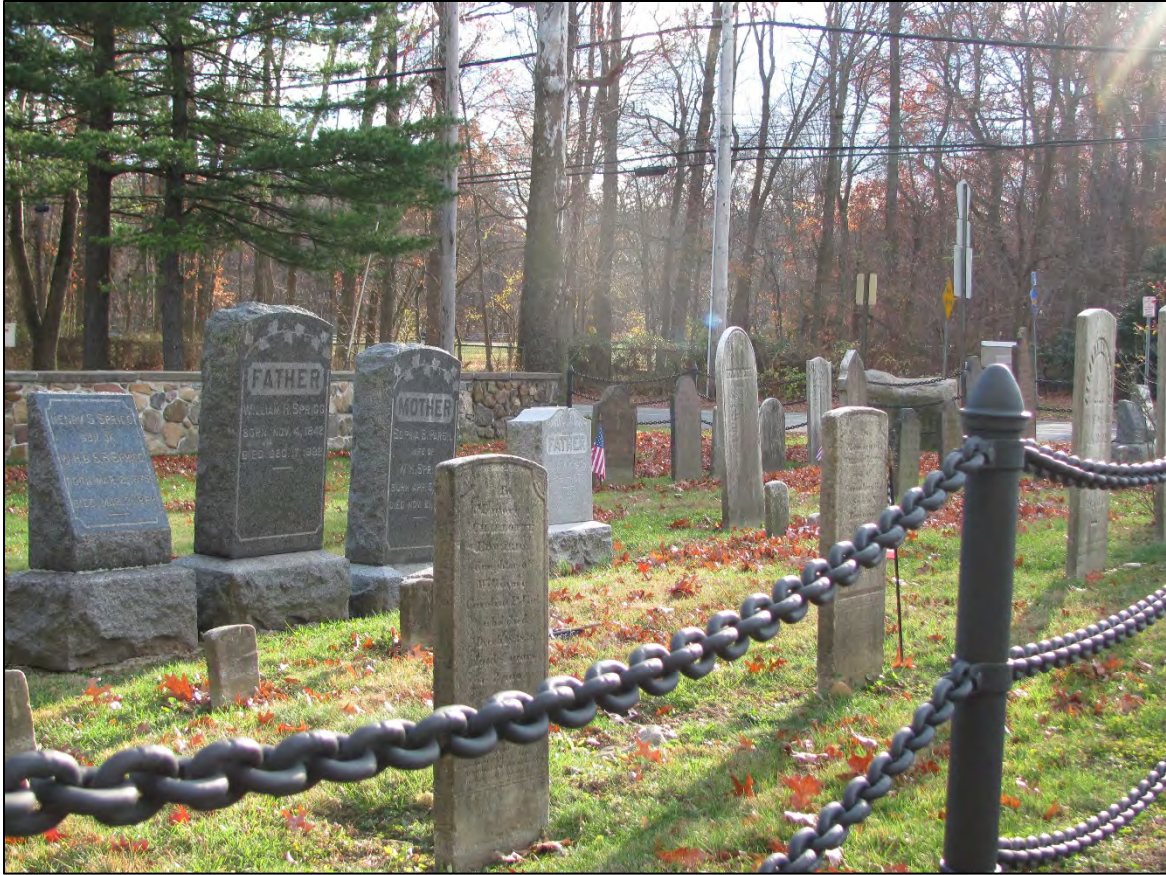


In 2013, Millburn Township purchased the Parsil House for \$635,000 to save it from being torn down, among other township reasons. It was bought so the Millburn-Short Hills Historical Society could use it as a museum of town history. A \$150,000 grant also was given to the historical society by Essex County and the township to improve the exterior of the house. The historical society would be responsible for the interior maintenance. The work on the house continues.

The municipality acquired the cemetery property in 2014, through a New Jersey Superior Court ruling. Around the same time, another restoration of the cemetery began, this time thanks to the efforts of the Rolling Hills Garden Club and the township. The project took about a year to complete and cost about \$20,000. Many tombstones that had been laying above ground were reset. Some that were broken required metal braces. In addition, the stone wall at the back of the cemetery was reconstructed, iron posts were reset and the gate-latch was repaired. In 2015, Troop 17 Scout Jonathan Salinardo repainted, brushed and cleaned the chain fence around the cemetery for his Eagle Project.



The Parsil House and some of the headstones in the cemetery are listed in the National Park Service's Historic American Buildings Survey collection. HABS began during the Great Depression when Charles E. Peterson of the NPS submitted a proposal for 1,000 out-of-work architects to spend 10 weeks documenting "America's antique buildings." HABS became a permanent program of the NPS in 1934 and then authorized by Congress the next year. (See images from the survey at the end of this document.)

- Someone who died an untimely or premature death
- Usually seen on a younger person's gravestone
- Symbol of a life cut short

- The sacraments

- Mourning

Bible/Book

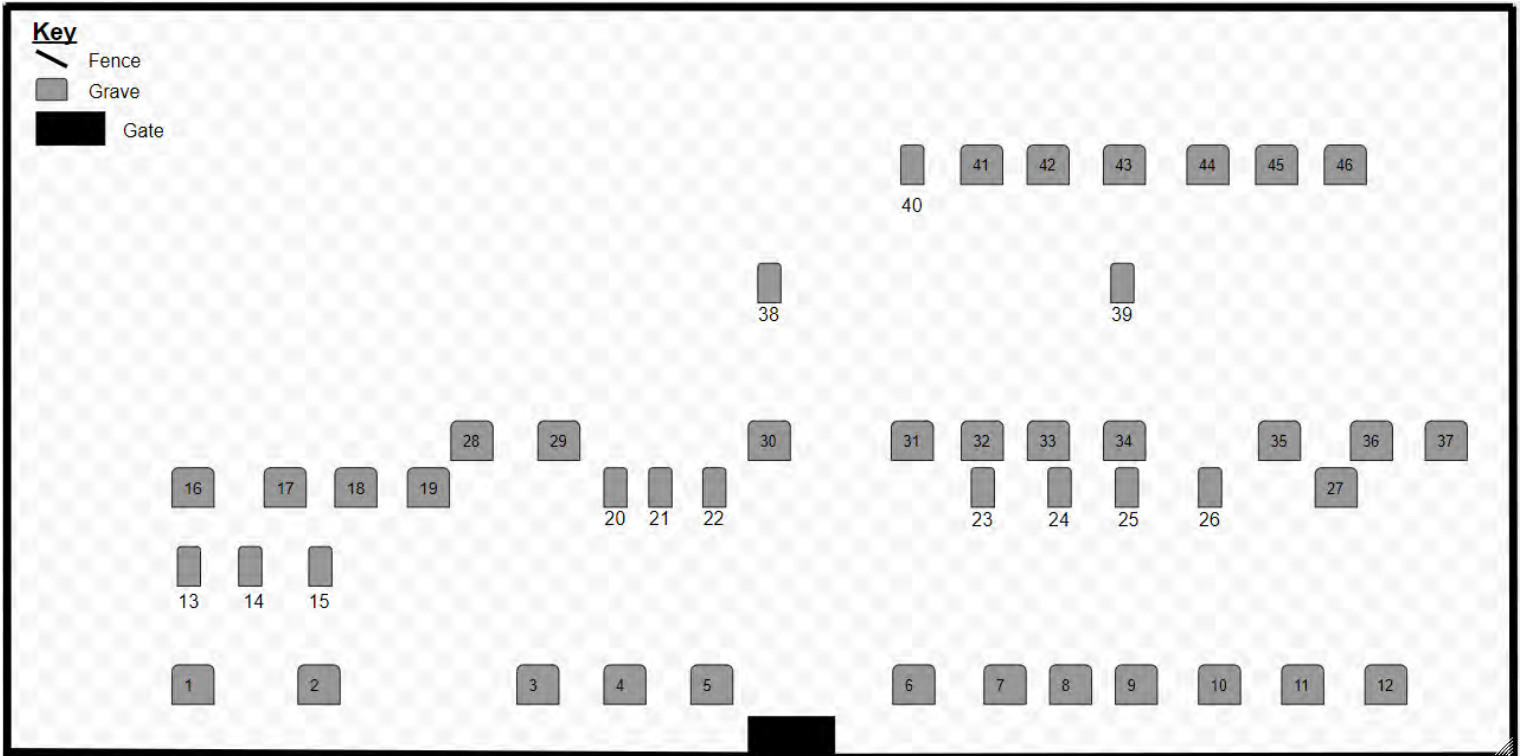
- Often used on the gravestones of a minister or clergyman or devoted religious people.
- Represent a person's good deeds and accomplishments being recorded in the Book of Life.
- Books have long had a meaning of knowledge, and sometimes symbolize the story of a life, so a memorial tombstone of a book when closed can be seen as a final act written; when open, as perfect knowledge; with a cross laying over it, faith personified.
- Gravestones in the shape of books can also be representative of a person's good deeds and accomplishments, and symbolize the record keeping in the Book of Life. Sometimes if a person died at a young age, the book will appear shorter on one side, to show that a person had died young. Sometimes, books or bible-shaped gravestones are used on the gravestones of ministers or clergymen to show their dedication to their faith.

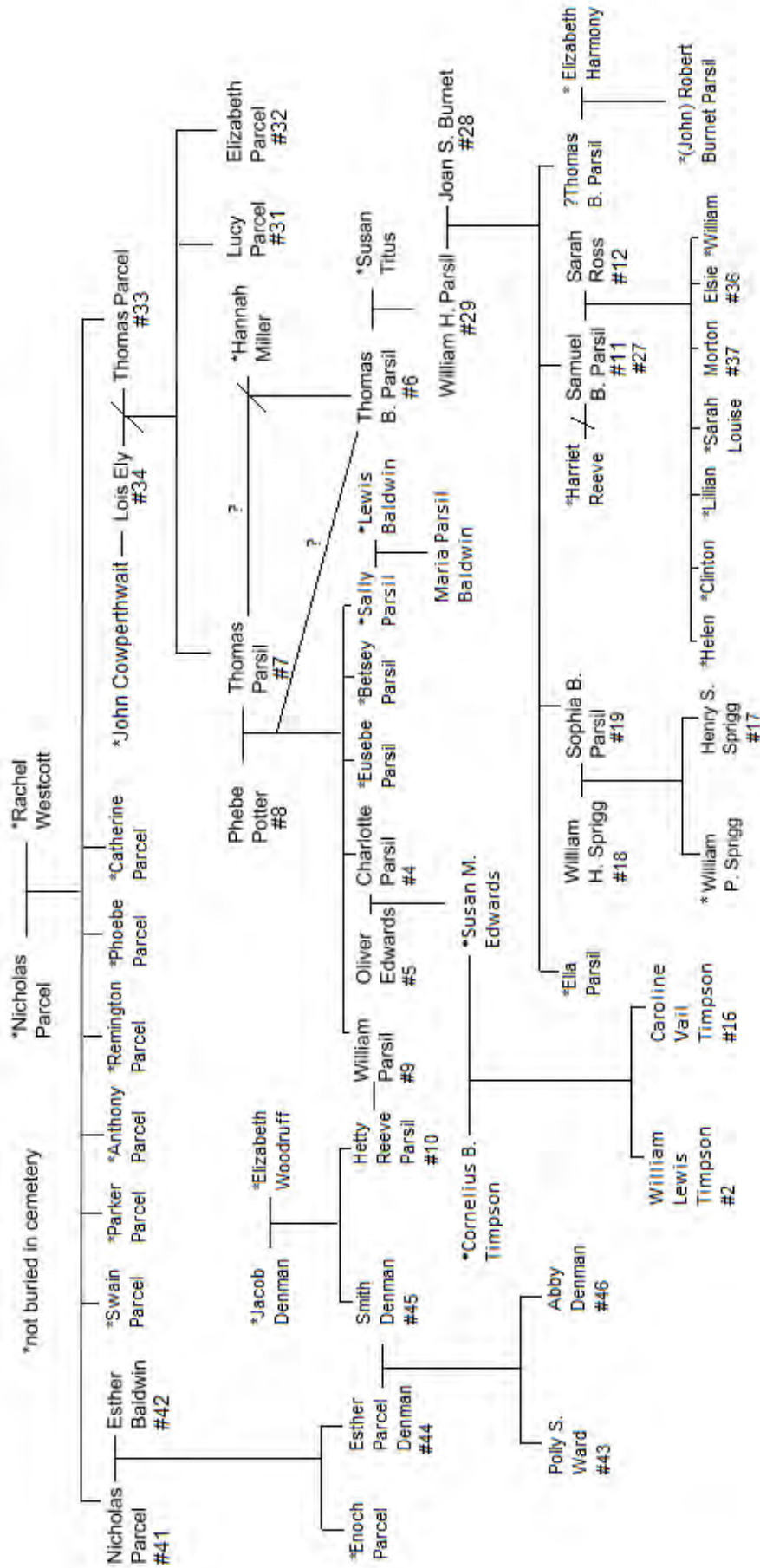

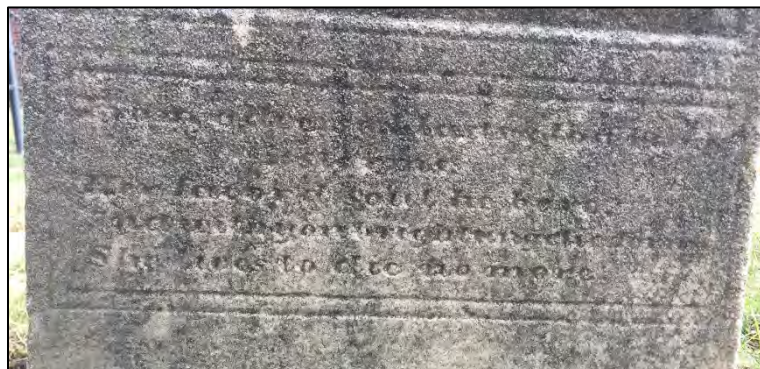
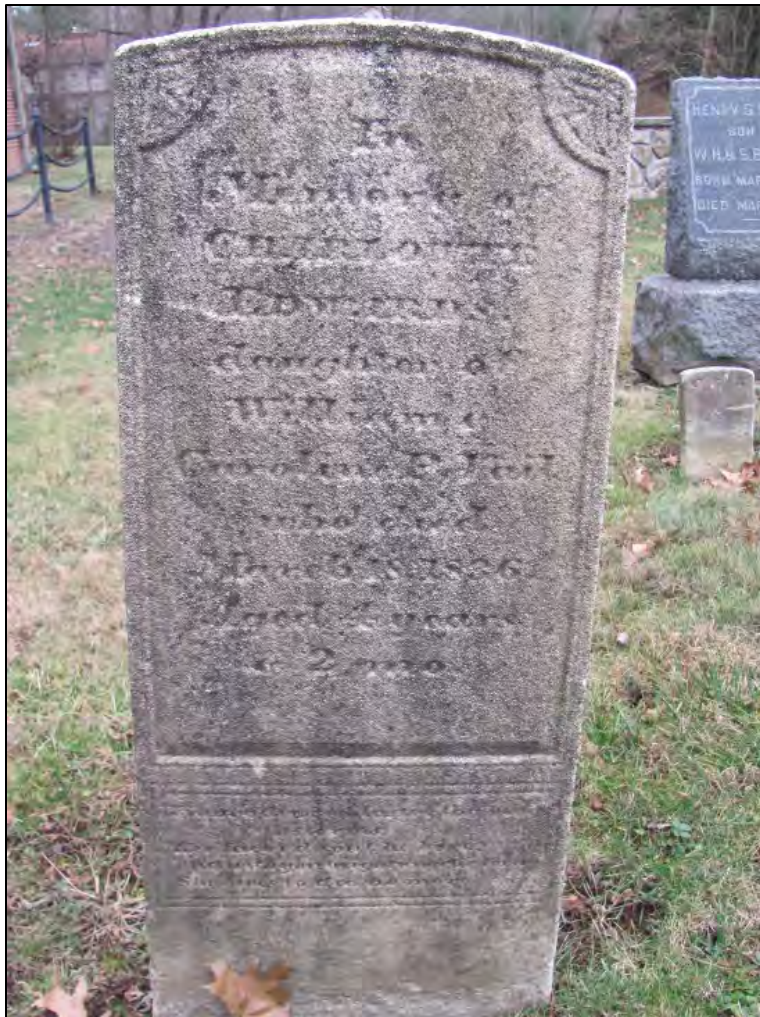
First Row

1) Charlotte Edwards

Charlotte Edwards was born on Jan. 18, 1832, and died on March 18, 1836, at age 4. She is the daughter of William Edwards and Caroline Parsil.

Gravestone:

In memory of Charlotte Edwards Daughter of William and Caroline Parsil who died March 18, 1836 Aged 4 years 2 months. From adverse blasts, and lowering storms, Her favor'd soul he bore; And with yon bright angelic forms, She lives to die no more.



2) William Lewis Timpson

William Lewis Timpson was born on June 16, 1836, and died on Sept. 4, 1837, at age 1. He was the son of Cornelius B. Timpson and Susan M. Timpson. His mother was the daughter of Oliver Edwards (#5) and Charlotte Parsil (#4). He had an older sister named Caroline Vail Timpson (#16).

William's footstone may be #15.

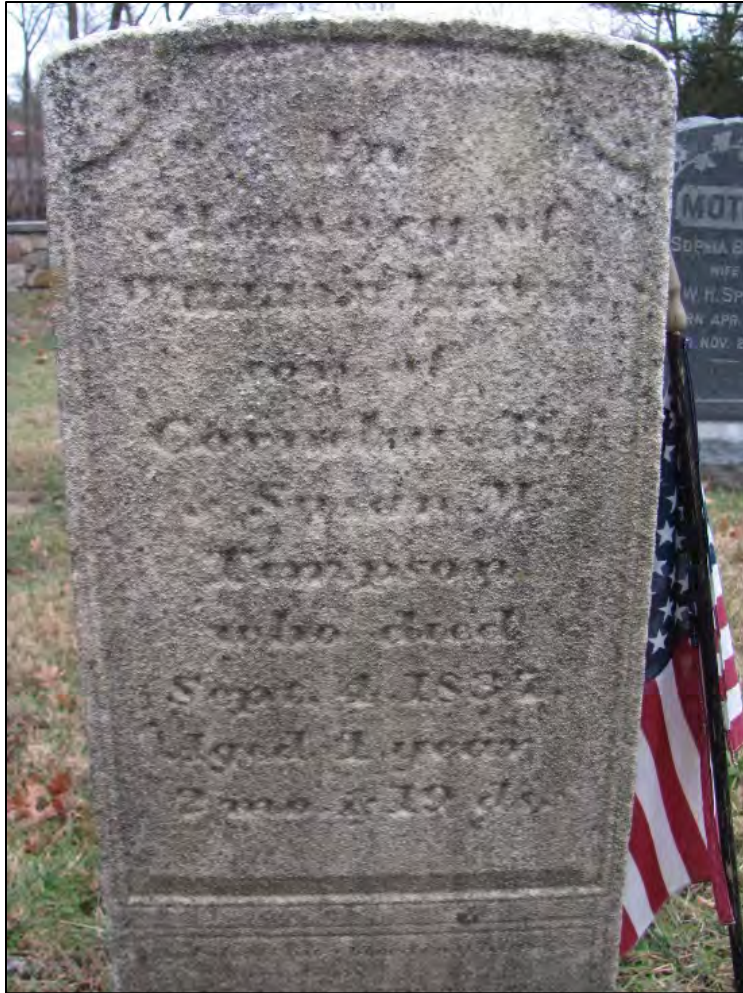
According to U.S. Presbyterian Church records, William was baptized on Jan. 27, 1837, at the Seventh Presbyterian Church in New York City, along with his sister.

3) Abraham Edwards

Abraham Edwards was born on July 18, 1821, in New York, and died on May 5, 1853, in Southold County, Long Island, at age 31. He married Sarah Ann Goldsmith (1829-1910) on Dec. 23, 1846, and they had a son, Oliver Hull Goldsmith Edwards, in 1849. His parents were David Edwards (1781-1831) and Esther Barnes (1791-1853).

Abraham's footstone may be #21.

Gravestone:

Abraham Edwards. Born in New York. July 18, 1821. Died at Southold L.I May 5, 1853. His death was as tranquil and quiet as his nature was noble generous and refined.

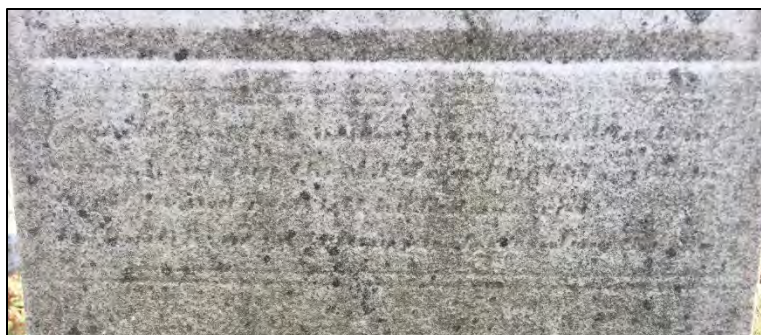


4) Charlotte Parsil Edwards

Charlotte Parsil Edwards was born on June 27, 1792, in Essex County, N.J., and died on July 9, 1836, at age 44. She was the wife of Oliver Edwards (#5), whom she married on March 3, 1811. They had a daughter, Susan M. Edwards, in 1814. (Susan died in 1896.) After her husband died, Charlotte was a widow for only six months before her own death. Her parents were Thomas Parsil (#7) and Phebe Potter Parsil (#8).

5) Oliver Edwards

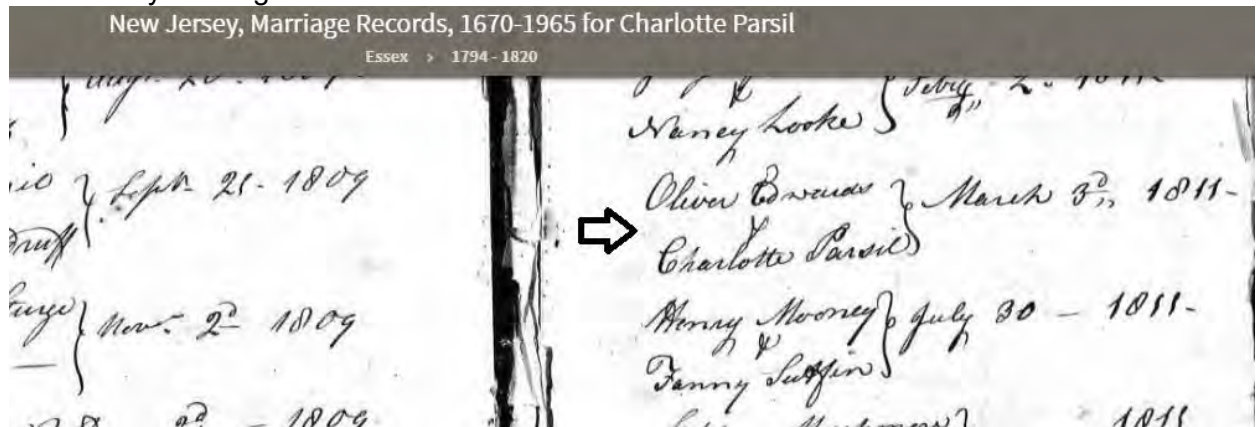
Oliver Edwards was born on Feb. 8, 1791, in New Jersey and died on Jan. 14, 1836, at age 45. He was the husband of Charlotte Parsil (#4), who he married on March 3, 1811. They had a daughter, Susan M. Edwards, in 1814. (Susan died in 1896.)

Oliver's footstone may be #22.

Oliver's parents were Capt. Aaron Edwards (1756-1804) and Desire Minor Edwards (1759-1807). In his father's will, dated Aug. 26, 1804, Oliver was to receive the family homestead, after the death or marriage of his mother.

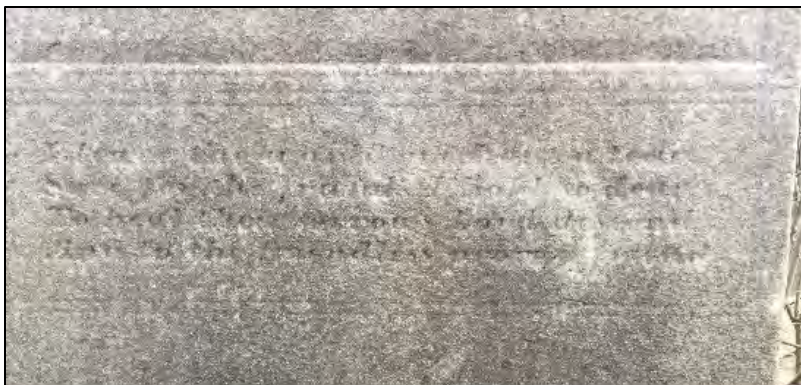
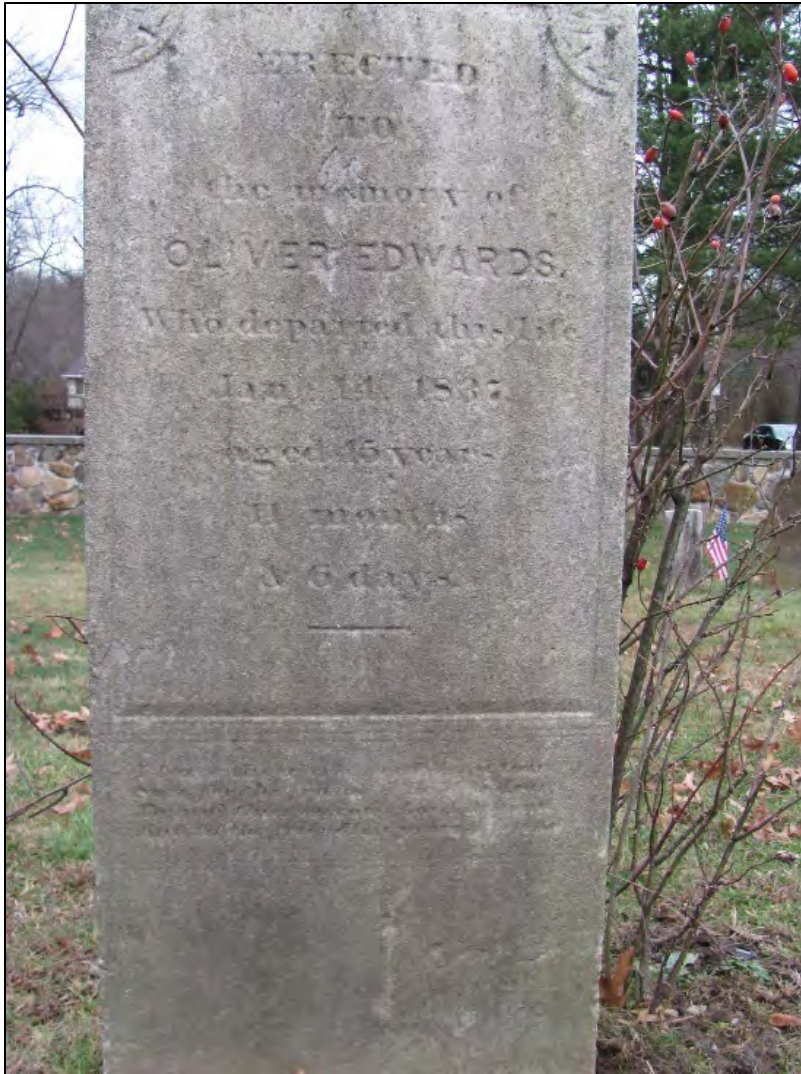

6) Thomas B. Parsil

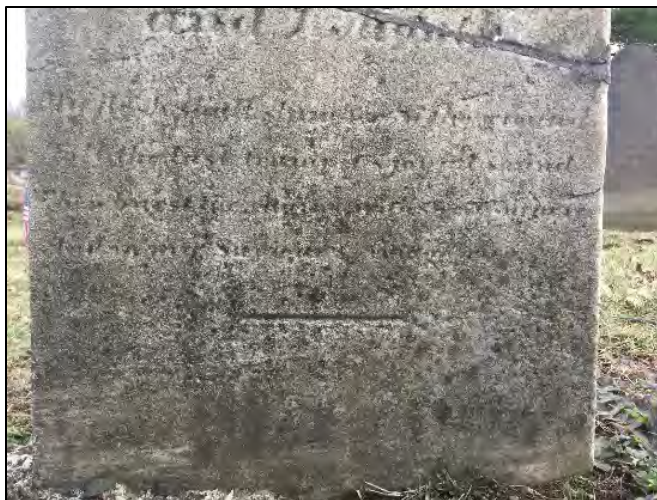
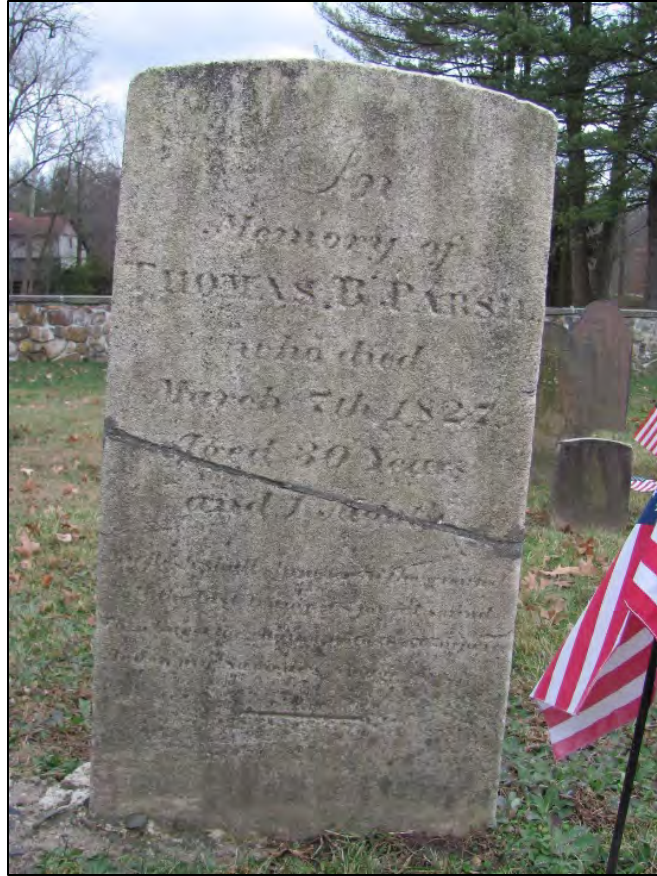
Thomas B. Parsil was born in February 1797 in Essex County, N.J., and died on March 7, 1827, at age 30. His wife was Susan Titus. His father was Thomas Parsil (#7). In some records, his mother is Phebe Potter (#8) and in others it's Hannah Miller.

According to New Jersey records, it was believed Thomas B. Parsil died without a written will.

7) Thomas Parsil

Thomas Parsil was born on Jan. 5, 1771, in Essex County, N.J., and died on Jan. 18, 1836, at age 65. He was baptized in 1771 in the Turkey Presbyterian Church (now the Presbyterian Church of New Providence). He married Phebe Parsil (#8) on Nov. 27, 1791. His parents were Thomas Parcel (#33) and Lois Ely (#34). His sisters were Lucy (#31) and Elizabeth (#32).

In Thomas' will dated 1834, he leaves portions of his estate to his wife, Phebe, son William (#9), daughters Charlotte (#4), Betsey, Eusebe and Sally (Sarah Denman), and grandsons William H. Parsil, Edwin Parsil, Lawrety Parsil and Abraham Edwards (#3?). Since his son Thomas B. (#6) had died before him, he wasn't included in the will. It appears his sons-in-law – Oliver Edwards (#5 and Charlotte's husband) and Lewis Baldwin (Sally's husband) – were the executors of his will.

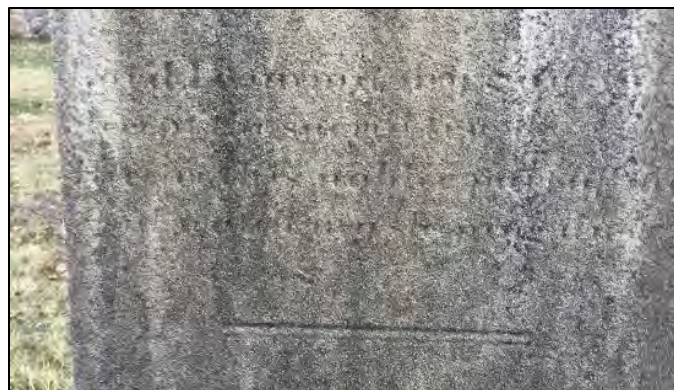
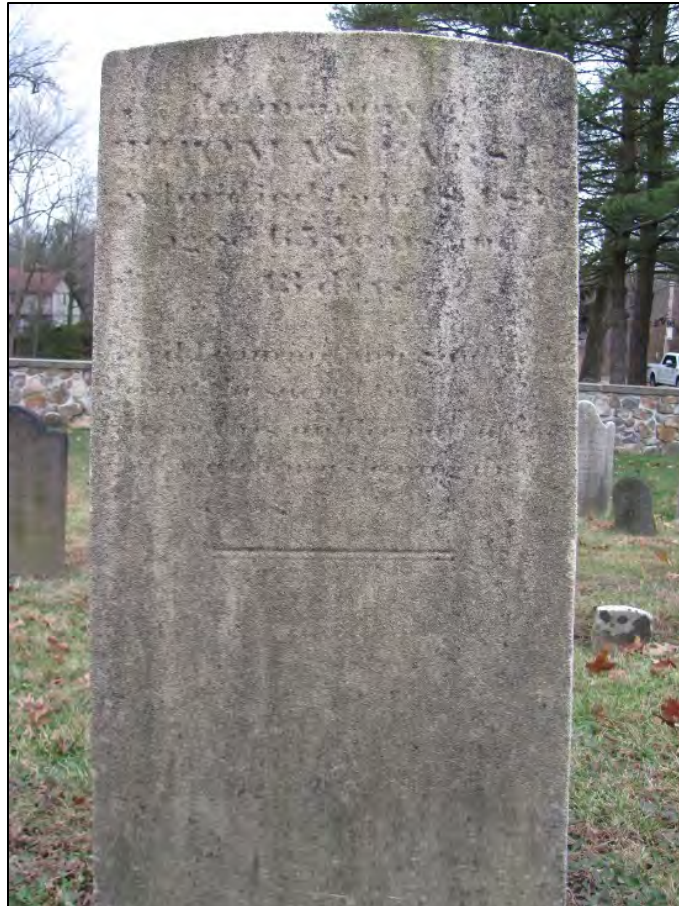

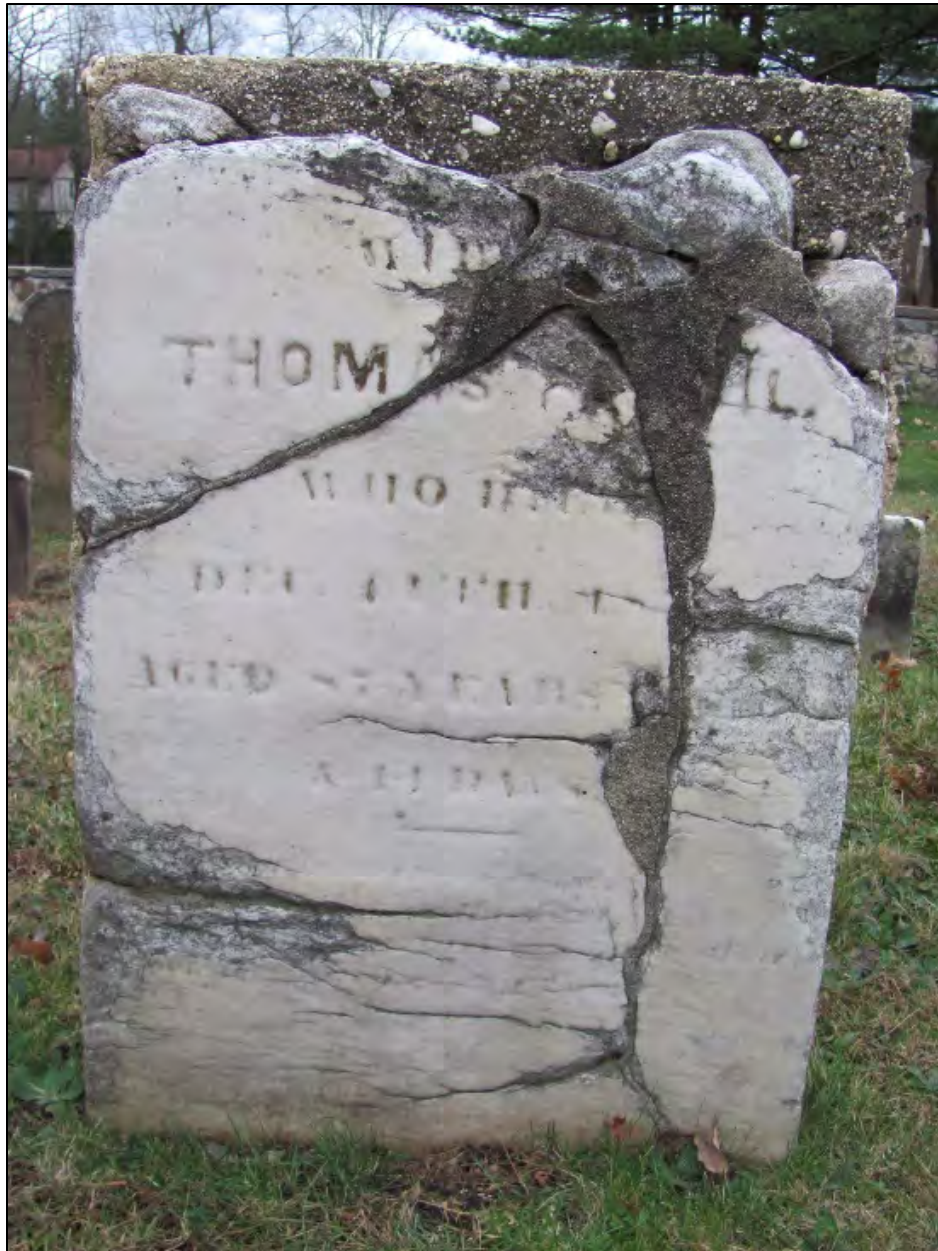
8) Phebe Potter Parsil

Phebe Potter Parsil was born in February 1772 and died on Dec. 14, 1859, at age 87. She married Thomas Parsil (#7) on Nov. 27, 1791. Her children included Charlotte (#4), William (#9) and possibly Thomas (#6).

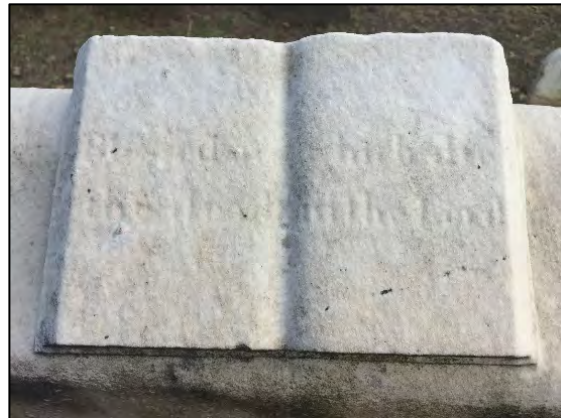
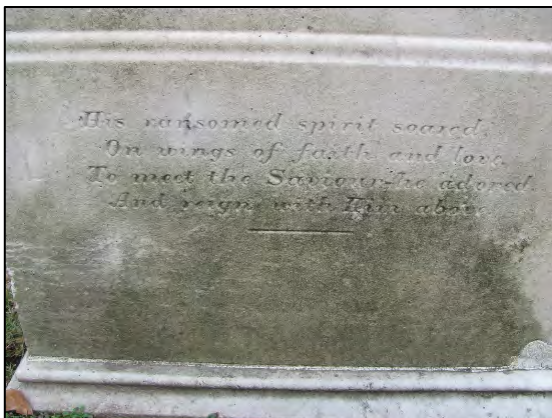
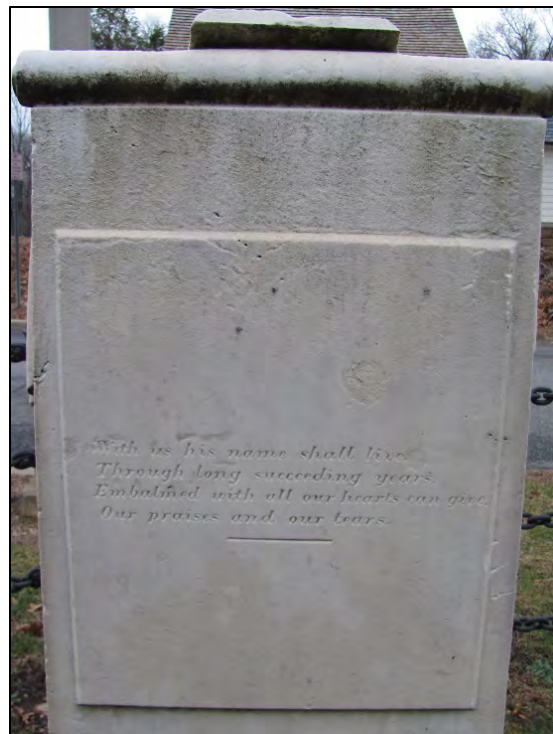
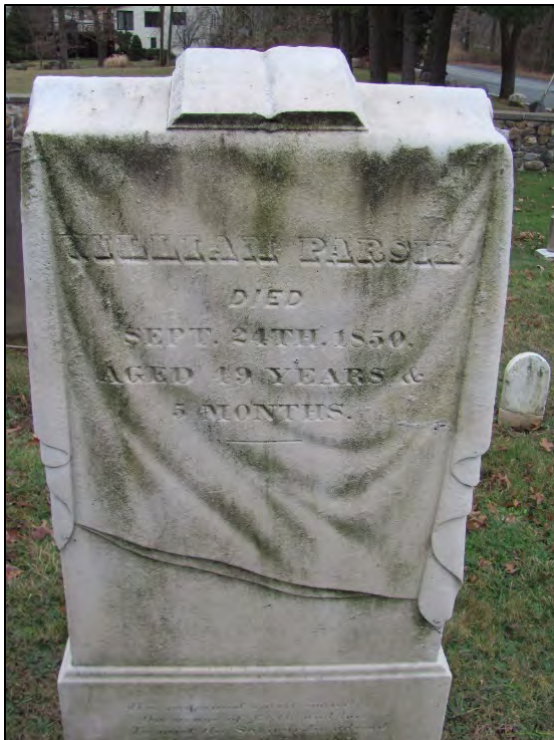
9) William Parsil

William Parsil was born in April 1801 and died on Sept. 24, 1850, at age 49. He married Hetty Reeve (#10) on Sept. 26, 1821. The gravestone has an open book symbol at top because he was the founder of the White Oak Ridge Chapel. The gravestone resembles a draped lectern.

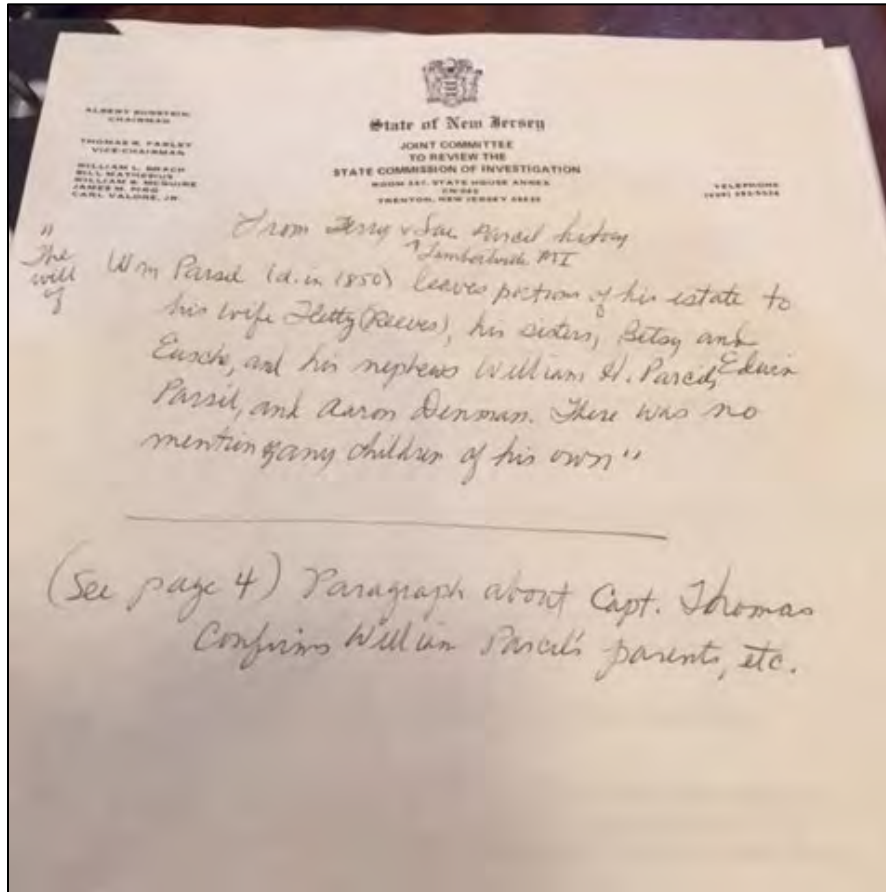
Gravestone:

William Parsil died September 24, 1850. Aged 49 years & 5 months. His ransomed spirit soared On wings of faith and love To meet the Savior - he adored And reign with Him above.

According to a copy of the will at the Millburn-Short Hills Historical Society, as well as a letter from the State of New Jersey, the will of William Parsil left portions of his estate to his wife, Hetty, his sisters, Betsey and Eusebe, and his nephews William H. Parcel (Parsil) (#29), Edwin Parsil and Aaron Denman. There was no mention of any children of his own. He also designated funds to build the fence around the cemetery.



Here is a portion of William's will that mentions leaving a Bible to his sisters and nephews William H. and Edwin Parsil.

In the Name of God Amen.
I, William Parsil
of the Township of Springfield, Co. of Essex and State of
New Jersey, being in the full possession of my reason
and desirous of having all my worldly affairs satisfac-
torily adjusted and arranged in the event of my
decease, do make, testify, and declare this to be my
last Will & Testament - So with
I commit my body to the ground out of which it
was taken, my soul to God in the sure and blessed
hope of a happy resurrection - and a glorious Im-
mortality -
With respect to my worldly goods and property
I direct that first of all, my Funeral Expenses and
all my just debts be paid -
Out of what remains I direct my Executors to

procure a Quarto Family Bible of the American
Bible Society, 5th Edition (Purple Cover) and give to
each of my Sisters, a copy each, with their names
labelled on the cover in testimony of my sincere love
and esteem - and also a Copy of the same Edition of
the Bible in the same style of binding to my Nephew
William H. Parsil and one in like manner to
my Nephew Edwin Parsil.
All my Household Goods and furniture to-
gether with all my movable property of whatever kind
I own and bequeath to my Beloved Wife Hettie Parsil.

Here is a portion of William's will that mentions that he leaves to his wife, Hetty, the remainder of his property personal and real during the time of her living as his widow. In the event of her death or remarriage, he leaves his property to nephew Aaron O. Denman. Aaron is probably the father of William Parsil Denman (#40), but it's unclear who Aaron's parents were. William also left \$200 to his sister Eusebe and \$500 to his nephew Edwin Parsil. This portion also mentions his request for the stone wall around the graveyard in front of his house.

The use of all the remainder of my Property personal and real I give & bequeath to my beloved wife Hetty Parsil, during the time of her living and continuing my widow - and in case the said income of my Estate should prove from any cause insufficient for her necessary and comfortable maintenance, I authorize and direct my Executors to sell for her benefit, the piece of woodland belonging to me, adjoining the Passage Woodland of the Parish of Springfield or to appropriate such a portion of my other property as to them may seem suitable and necessary.

In the event of her Marriage ^{at her} or death, I then give & bequeath of what remains of my property to my Nephew Aaron O. Denman, my choice, the lot or what it stands containing One Acre or more of land with all the buildings pertaining thereto - to my beloved sister Eusebe wife of William C. Brown, I give and bequeath the sum of Two Hundred Dollars - and to my Nephew Edwin Parsil the sum of Five Hundred Dollars - I do further direct my Executors to cause to be erected out of the residue of my Estate, around the graveyard in front of my ~~Estate~~ house, a substantial and durable Stone wall of suitable height & covered with an Iron Gate for its entrance at an expense not to exceed Five Hundred Dollars.

In the 1850 U.S. Federal Census – done on Sept. 5, 1850, the same month William died - he is listed as a shoemaker, living with his wife, Hetty, in Springfield.

10) Hetty Reeve Parsil

Hetty Reeve Parsil was born on April 26, 1801, in Springfield, N.J., and died on June 8, 1874, at age 73. She was the wife of William Parsil (#9), whom she married on Sept. 26, 1821. She was a widow for 29 years. Her parents were Jacob Denman and Elizabeth Woodruff. She was one of eight children and her brother was Smith Denman (#45). The grave marker has a drapery symbol.

Hetty's footstone may be #26.

Gravestone:

11) Samuel B. Parsil

Samuel B. Parsil was born in Nov. 19, 1841, in Springfield Township, N.J., and died on March 7, 1919, at age 78. His first wife was Harriet Reeve, who lived down the street from him. They married on Dec. 31, 1868. Harriet died in 1872 and is buried in Fair Mount Cemetery in Chatham, N.J. His second wife was Sarah L. Parsil (nee Ross) (#12), whom he married on May 29, 1878. His children included Elsie (#36), Morton (#37), Sarah Louise "Sadie" (see photo), Lillian Adelaide Vreeland (see photo), Clinton Roy, Helen Speer and William Harold, who is buried at Presbyterian Cemetery in Springfield, N.J. Samuel's parents were William H. Parsil (#29) and Joan S. Burnet (#28). He was a farm helper in 1860, a farmer in 1870 and a laborer in 1880. Samuel also has a war grave (#27) in the cemetery for his service in the U.S. Civil War. He fought for the Union as a private in New Jersey Company F, 27th Regiment, for a period of nine months – Sept. 19, 1862, to July 2, 1863, according to New Jersey Civil War records. This grave marker has the vine symbol.

12) Sarah Louisa Parsil

Sarah Louisa Parsil was born Jan. 1, 1851, in Livingston Township, N.J., and died in 1933 at age 82. She was the second wife of Samuel B. Parsil (#11). She married Samuel in 1878. 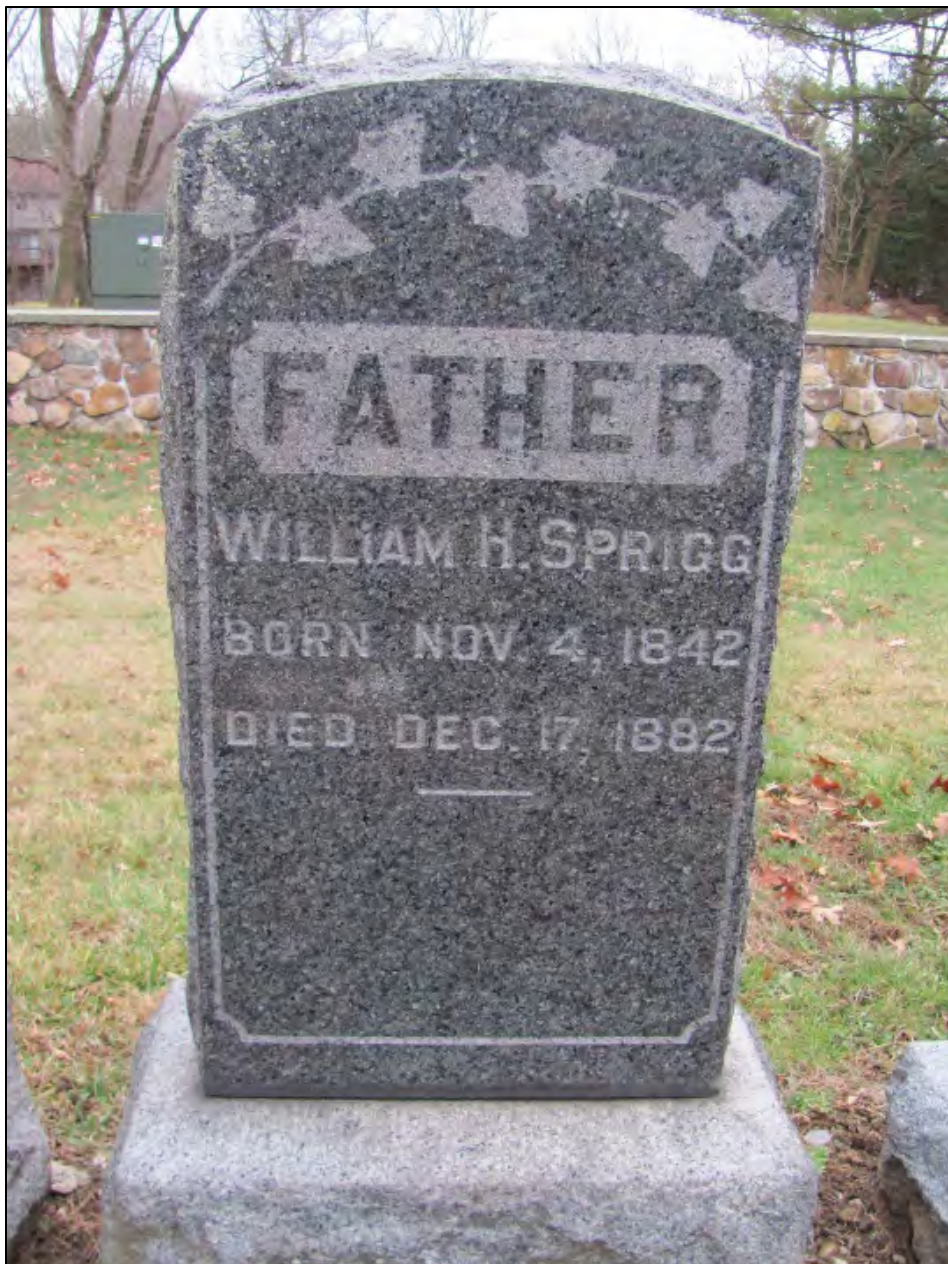

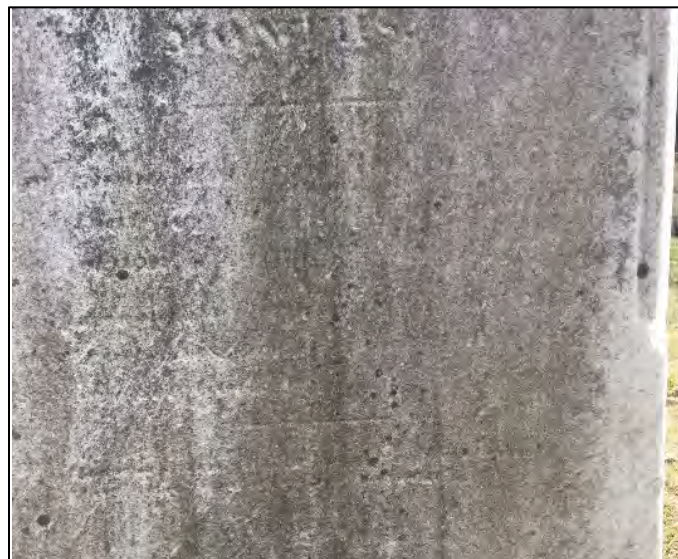

Lucy Parcel was born on March 24, 1774, in Essex County, N.J., and died on Feb. 6, 1777, at age 2. Her parents were Thomas Parcel (#33) and Lois Parcel (#34). She had a younger sister named Elizabeth (#32), who died a few months before she did. Thomas (#7) was her brother. Lucy's grave marker has a winged skull symbol.

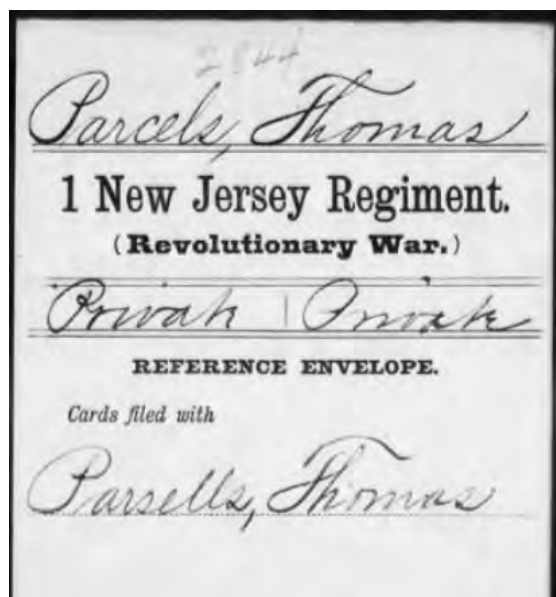

33) Capt. Thomas Parcel

Capt. Thomas Parcel was born in 1744 in White Oak Ridge, N.J. (now Short Hills), and died on July 4, 1778, at age 34. His wife was Lois (#34) and his two daughters were Lucy (#31) and Elizabeth (#32), and his son was Thomas (#7). His grandfather's name was William Parsil Jr. and his brother was Nicholas Parcel (#41). Thomas served as a private in Capt. Isaac Reeve's company, 2nd Regiment, Essex County, N.J., militia. However, Thomas' grave marker refers to him as captain. It is unclear how he became a captain. DAR records indicate Thomas served as a private and his Revolutionary War service record notes that he went in as a private and came out as a private. Thomas was mortally wounded at the Battle of Connecticut Farms (now Union). He was brought home to the Parsil House, where he died under the shade of a large locust tree on the second anniversary of the Declaration of Independence. According to 1778 tax record, Thomas and his brother Nicholas were partners in a saw mill prior to the Revolutionary War. According to a 1933 article in the Newark Evening News, Thomas was the first person to be buried in this cemetery, even though his daughters, Elizabeth and Lucy, died before him. It is possible that the daughters' graves were transferred to the cemetery at a later date. The cemetery is the last remnant of the family property.

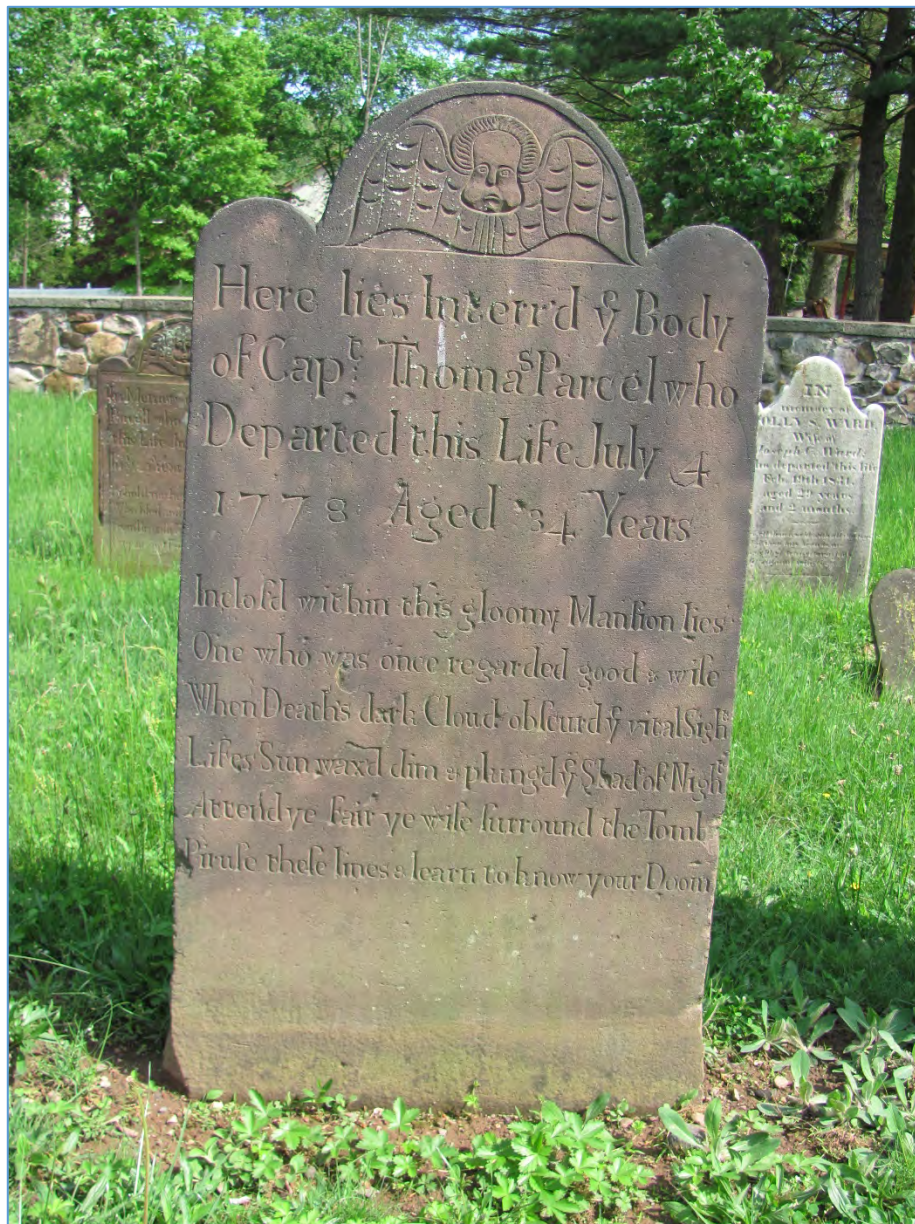

Their daughters Elizabeth (#32) and Lucy (#31) both died when Lois was 31. After Lois became a widow, she married John Cowperthwaite. Her grave marker was created by J.C. Mooney, who was a noted stone carver from Union, N.J. The grave is a classical tomb from the Federal Period. The grave marker has a willow tree symbol.

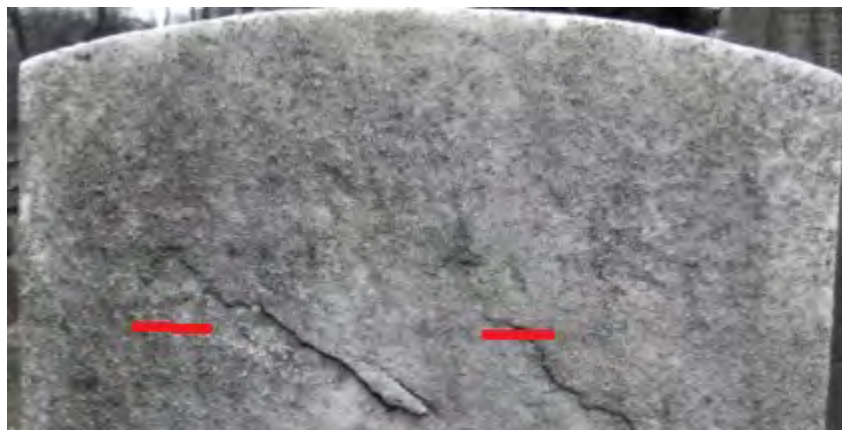

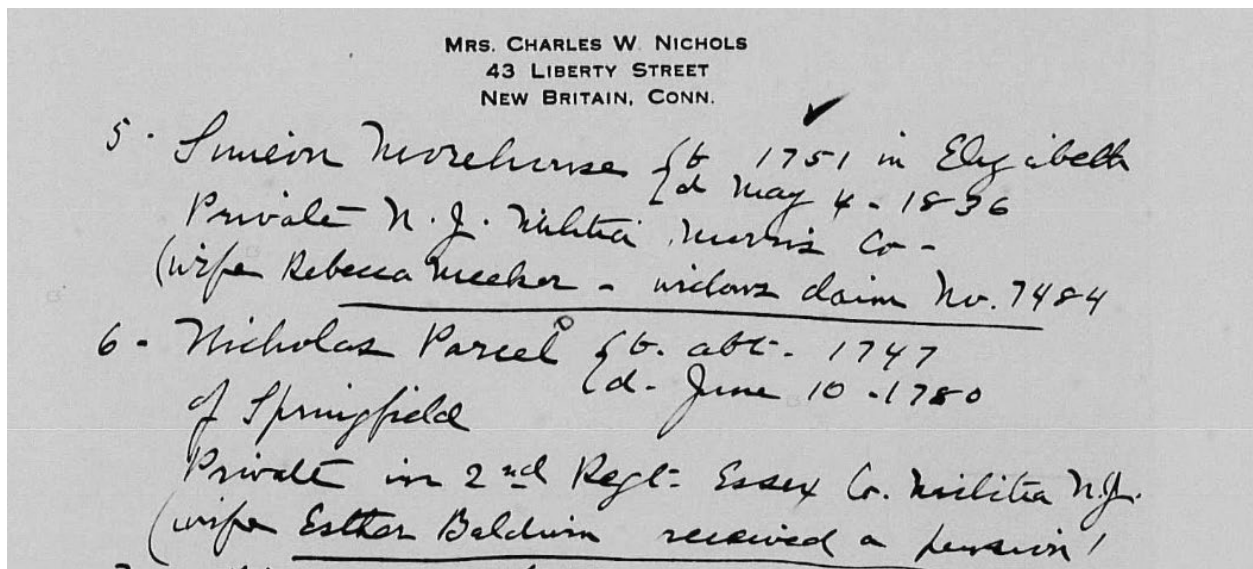

41) Nicholas Parcel/Parcell

Nicholas Parcel was born in 1747 in New Jersey and died on June 10, 1780, at age 33. His grandfather was William Parcel Jr. and his older brother was Thomas Parcel (#33). He married Esther Baldwin (#42) and their daughter was Esther Parcel Denman (#44). Nicholas served in the Revolutionary War as a private in Capt. Isaac Reeve's company, 2nd Regiment, Essex County, N.J., militia. He was given a pension, which Esther Baldwin used after his death. Nicholas died as a result of being wounded in one of the several engagements in the Battle of Springfield, which reached its conclusion on June 23, 1780.

The stone carver for his grave also made his brother's grave. Though most records have his last name spelled Parcel, like his brother, it is spelled Parcell on his gravestone. The inscription on his tomb was carved while the Battle of Springfield was still raging and there was no way of knowing which side would eventually be victorious in the conflict. For many years the gravestone lay fallen on the ground. The final line of the epitaph, which is a phrase or statement written in memory of a person who has died, was sunken in the earth. The line reads, "Prepare my Friends to follow me," which is both a harbinger of impending doom and a call to arms.

Willie Sprigg was born Dec. 7, 1869 in South Orange, N.J., and died Sept. 6, 1870, at age 9 months. His parents were William H. Sprigg (#26) and Sophia B. Parsil Sprigg (#27), and his brother was Henry S. Sprigg (#25). His gravestone allegedly reads "Rest Little One."

Joseph C. Ward

Joseph C. Ward died on Feb. 19, 1831, at aged 29 years and 2 months. His wife was Polly S. Ward (#43).

Thomas B. Parsil (son of William H. Parsil and Joan S. Burnet)

Thomas B. Parsil was born Aug. 16, 1848, and died June 26, 1946. He married Elizabeth Harmony (1846-1915) on Sept. 27, 1871. According to records at the Millburn-Short Hills Historical Society from family member Sue Parsil in 2002, Thomas' death certificate indicates he was buried in the White Oak Ridge cemetery. However, no gravestone could be found in the cemetery for him – unless it is one of the unidentified ones. Sue Parsil also wrote that Thomas' granddaughter, Kathryn Parsil Noyes, said her grandfather was the last Parsil buried in the family cemetery before it was turned over to the Daughters of the American Revolution.

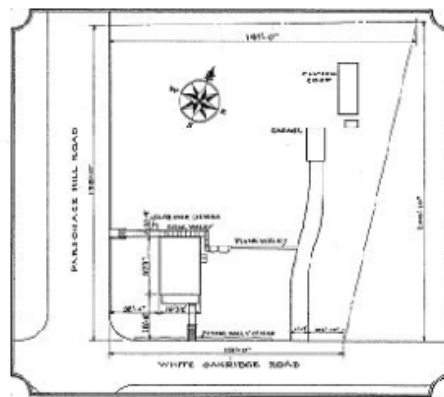

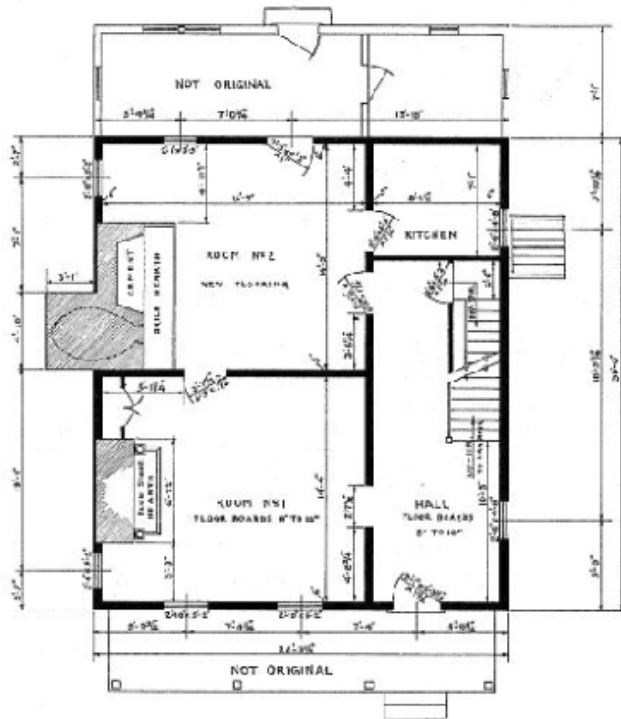
